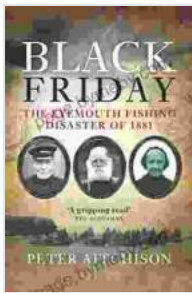


Black Friday: The Eyemouth Fishing Disaster of 1881

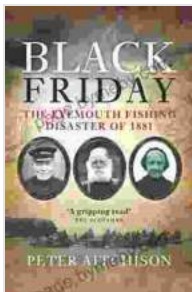

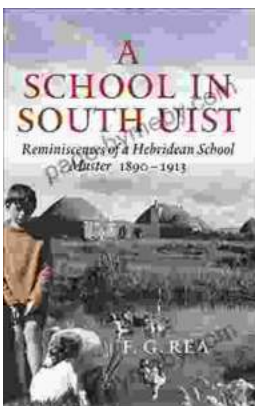
